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



Spanish and all and dialects spoken in the country. Spanish and all Indigenous languages have the status of official languages. Of these, the census indicates that Spanish is the most widely spoken as a first language (70% of the population), followed by Quechua (18%) and Aymara (17%). There are 829 named languages referenced in the 2010 census-indonesian (known locally as Bahasa Indonesia) is the primary legula france throughout Indonesia. 
