

Keiko Osaki-Tomita, a national of Japan, is the Chief of Demographic and Social Statistics Branch, the United Nations Statistics Division, Department of Economic and Social Affairs at the United Nations Headquarters in New York. She leads the Statistics Division's work in the area of demographic and social statistics, including population and housing censuses, vital registration, demographic and social data collection and dissemination, and oversees the development of a comprehensive social statistics programme. She also coordinates work related to demographic and social statistics within Statistics Division and the Department, as well as other organizations of the United Nations system.

Her long career at the United Nations started in 1988 at the Fertility and Family Studies Section, Population Division, the United Nations Headquarters, where she undertook research on the worldwide trends in fertility and its determinants, as well as living arrangements of people. Later, she moved to the Mortality and Migration Section of the Division and served as the Chief of Migration Section of the Division. In this role, she oversaw the preparation of several technical publications, and Secretary-General's reports on international migration and development for the submission to the General Assembly.

Prior to her appointment to the Chief of Demographic and Social Statistics Branch, she was the Chief of Social Policy and Population Section, Social Development Division, the United Nations Economic Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP) (2005-2009) where she was responsible for planning, coordinating and overseeing the management of the regional programme on population and key social development issues such as youth, ageing, family and disability.

She received education both in Japan and the U.S. She holds a M.A. in Demography from Georgetown University, U.S. and a Ph.D. in Sociology from Fordham University, U.S. Between 1998 and 1999, She was a visiting fellow of the Institute for Population and Social Research (IPSR), Mahidol University, Thailand.

She has written and published widely in the field of international migration, especially on migration trends, migration statistics, remittances, and the multilateral cooperation mechanisms. Her article on remittance behavior of migrants received the Honorable Mention Award from American Sociological Association in 2002. She sits on editorial board of several academic publications, and was an editor-in-chief of Asia-Pacific Population Journal, published by UNESCAP.
