Time Use Surveys and the data-to-policy link

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Time use data captures 'invisible' work

Unpaid domestic and care work

Unpaid/poorly captured market work

Simultaneous paid and unpaid activities can be difficult to capture

- Time use surveys are currently the most appropriate way to measure unpaid work activities
- Unpaid family workers
- Casual, temporary, seasonal labor in agriculture and small informal enterprises

 Women often perform paid and unpaid activities simultaneously



What else mediates the data to policy link?

- Politics policy making is an organic process embedded in political realities and political timing matters
- Context uptake is easier with data that talks to social and economic trends
- Capacity evidence-based data culture facilitates data uptake



Conclusions

- Unravelling the relationship between paid and unpaid work is crucial for economies: Time Use Data provides the missing link
- Time Use Data has directly and indirectly impacted policy
- But, TU data remains underproduced and underutilized
- Data uptake difficult to track due to organic nature of policy process and incomplete, anecdotal information on data to policy links
- Communications disconnect between producers and users
