- Educational Gap: Survey shows majority of professionals in geographical names management lack formal training
- Global Challenge: Training deficit spans across all continents
- Funding Constraints: Limited capacity to support experts from developing countries
- Critical Need: Toponymic expertise crucial for
 - Sustainable geographical names management
 - Ensure continued consequent national geographical names standardization
 - Sustainable development and cultural heritage preservation
