

## **UNGEGN-UN** Group of Experts on Geographical Names

- A subsidiary body of ECOSOC
- Promotes standardization of geographical names in response to national requirements
- 3. Creates and follows-up on the implementation of resolutions and decisions
- 4. Provides a forum for discussion geographers, linguists, administrators, GIS specialists, cartographers ...
- Supported by a Secretariat, Statistics Division, 'under the Department of Economic and Social Affairs (DESA)
- 6. Creates working groups and task teams to focus on specific areas of current concern and interest
- 7. Has 24 geographical/linguistic divisions for grassroots work





## What UNGEGN is **NOT**

- Decision maker on feature names
- 2. Arbitrator of disputes over names
- 3. Place to air political issues, even if they are related in some way to geographical names
- 4. Decision maker on what processes, legislation or policy is correct for any country



### **UNGEGN's aims**

- Encourage the creation of national names authorities
  - backed by legislation
  - respect local usage of names
  - collect, store and disseminate authorized names for government and public use
- Raise awareness of the value and benefits of geographical names standardization
- Recognize the value of geographical names both to identify place and as elements of cultural heritage
- Develop single scientifically-based systems of romanization
- Contribute to work of UN bodies and collaborate with non-UN organizations such as UNESCO, UNMaps, PAIGH and Google Maps



## **Early days of UNGEGN**

- 1959 Resolution 715A (XXVII) of ECOSOC
  - To bring together experts to advise on geographical names for use in UN Cartography
- 1960 1<sup>st</sup> meeting of experts in New York
  - USA, France, UK, Iran, Guatemala, China
- 1967 First Conference held in Geneva
  - 11 conferences every 5 years until 2017
    - New York, Geneva, London, Athens, Montréal, Berlin
  - 30 UNGEGN sessions two (2) between conferences
    - New York, Geneva, Vienna, Nairobi, Bangkok

- (c) To study and propose principles, policies and methods suitable for resolving problems of national and international standardization:

#### Report of Sweden

The report of Sweden is divided into six sections. The first section provides a short overview of the legislation and of the main authorities involved in the standardization of geographical names. The second, on names in multilingual areas. includes comments on the activities carried out to increase the density of minority language place names in the Sami and Tornedalian areas in Sweden. The third section offers a description of several government initiatives aimed at increasing support for national minorities and minority languages in Sweden. The Institute for Language and Folklore is one expert body that has been consulted on these initiatives. This section also reports on the Institute's efforts to enhance educational and cultural activities within minority language revitalization for the national minorities through government grant schemes. The fourth section offers a presentation of the work of the Geographical Names Network. The Network is consulted on specific name questions including issuing recommendations on names of organizations and authorities and names relating to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs publication Utrikes namebok (a list of translations of names of countries and designations for their nationals). The fifth section presents the updated place names register at the Institute of Language and Folklore. Its collections of place names comprise, in total, some 3.7 million index cards. The database publishes place names used in Sweden from the earliest times to the present day, with information on their meanings, spelling and pronunciation. The final section provides a list of articles and books on place names and place name standardization written by Swedish experts.

- 6. may propose the closure of the list of speakers,
- 7. Propose a limitation on the time to be allowed to speakers and on the number of times that each member may speak on an item
- 8. May ask Bureau and Working Group members preside over agenda items

## **Guidelines for Speakers During the Session**

- Delegates are seated by Divisions for agenda items 3-10
- Be short and concise in your interventions three (3) minutes
- Address the Chair of session (when you address the Chair you address the Group of Experts as a whole).
- Wait to be asked to speak; your microphone will be unmuted
- Speak slowly to allow the Interpreters to do a good job.
- Responding only when invited by the Chair, not directly to another expert
- At all times show respect for other delegations as individuals and for the governments, states, nations and causes they represent.
